Being the only NSF rescuer on the team, I was given the 'Overseas Excellence Medal' and a 'National Day Home Team Award' in the same year. It was a great feeling. It was then I remembered Mrs. Joy Tan kind words, "You can enter the University." So, the recent accolades gave me a new boost of confidence to apply again. I was eager to make it happen despite all odds.

For this round of application to the university, I saw a new section called 'Discretionary Admissions' in the form, where a potential candidate could combine their grades with other merits and awards. So I decided to have a go - I combined my 'A' level results with these recent awards and medals which I had achieved during my NSF days as a fireman. Shortly after, I was granted an interview with the professors and I gave it my best shot, armed with a portfolio of achievements prepared by my best friend.

The great wait was over in a matter of weeks. And Viola! Here I am, in National University of Singapore (NUS)! I have opted for the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (FASS) in NUS.
