## **Section A – Educational Pathways After A-Levels**

### **What can I do to increase my chances of entering university?**

#### **Step 1: Apply to all six local Autonomous Universities**

Apply even if you are not confident of meeting the previous year's IGP (The cut-off varies each year). Ensure you have a combination of courses that include:

- o desired and 'safe' courses
- o a different course within the same university
- o a similar course at different universities

Note that ranking of choices matters. For instance, NUS offers first choice bonus points scheme for A Level graduates. You may refer to <https://www.nus.edu.sg/oam/undergraduate-programmes/1st-Choice> for more information.

**Step 2:** Opt-in for **Aptitude Based Admissions (ABA)**. Check out the respective websites.

#### **What are the alternatives to full-time degree programmes?**

**1: Consider taking up part-time degree programmes at SUSS (<https://www.suss.edu.sg/part-time-undergraduate>)**

Features of part-time degree programmes at SUSS:

- Lower admission criteria (two GCE A-Level passes).
- Same as full-time courses in all aspects (core modules, fees, scholarships, financial assistance, Honours, minors, 2<sup>nd</sup> major etc), just conducted in a part-time mode usually consisting of weekday evenings, Saturdays with a blend of face-to-face sessions as well as online learning.
- Two intakes a year compared to one intake for full-time courses.
- Course mates will include a wider mix of people.
- Possibility of graduating at the same time as compared to peers who are pursuing full-time courses.

# Part-time Undergraduate Admission Requirements

## Admission Criteria

You must be a Singapore citizen, permanent resident or a resident in Singapore. In addition, you will need to meet these minimum requirements:

- GCE 'A' Level with two passes (prior to 2006) or two H2 passes (from 2006); or local Polytechnic Diploma; or International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma; or NUS High School Diploma; or equivalent<sup>1</sup>
- Two years of full-time work experience, or currently employed on a full-time basis<sup>2</sup>
- At least 21 years old.

<sup>1</sup> Acceptable qualifications: Diploma from LASALLE College of the Arts; Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts (NAFA); National Institute of Education; and ITE Work-Study Diploma. Other Diploma qualifications (e.g., Advanced Diploma, Specialist Diploma, Conversion Diploma) plus an acceptable SAT or ACT (with Writing) score may be considered for admission on a case-by-case basis. For SAT, we require a minimum total score of 1,000 with at least 500 each for Reading and Math. You may submit your SAT scores directly to SUSS (recommended) or through SAT. Our institution code for SAT is 7382. For more information on SAT, please visit <http://sat.collegeboard.org/home>. For ACT, a minimum composite score of 24 with at least 7 for Writing is required. For more information on ACT, please visit <http://www.act.org/>. All scores must be submitted to SUSS by 31 March (for July intake) or 30 September (for January intake) of the admission year.

Scores must be obtained within the last 5 years up to the programme application year for consideration. Applicants without the SAT or ACT score may be given a provisional offer to take courses under the SUSS Continuing Education and Training scheme on a case-by-case basis. They may then progress to the undergraduate programme if conditions of the provisional offer are met.

<sup>2</sup> Applicants who have fully completed National Service will be deemed to have fulfilled the work experience criterion. Part-time employment will not be considered as full-time work experience, if the employee works less than 35 hours a week under a service contract with an employer. Applicants who are self-employed may refer to

## Exemption from Age and Work Experience Criteria

You can be exempted from the age and work experience eligibility criteria if you are in one of the following categories:

- i. Applicant sponsored by his/her company for the [part-time undergraduate degree programme](#). Applicant must submit sponsorship letter from his/her company as required supporting document; OR
- ii. Applicant who is currently employed in a job role/sector related to the part-time undergraduate degree programme. Applicant must submit supporting document detailing his/her job description from the company illustrating relevance of current role to the programme he/she is applying for.

Notwithstanding these exemptions, National Service (NS)-liable applicants must have fully discharged their full-time NS liability before they can be admitted into SUSS.

Supporting document(s) must be submitted, together with the admission application, for assessment. SUSS reserves the right to determine if exemption would be granted and the University's decision will be final and binding.

## 2: Consider Competency-based Stackable Micro-credentials (CSM) which can lead up to a degree qualification at SIT

Each micro-credential can be taken individually to earn a specialist certificate or can be stacked toward an SIT degree. Find out more at <https://www.singaporetech.edu.sg/sitlearn/csm-pathways>.

### 3: Consider the Arts Institutions such as University of the Arts, LASALLE, NAFA or similar Art- and Design-related courses at the five Polytechnics:

All five polytechnics as well as the new University of the Arts (UAS), LASALLE and NAFA offer arts and design related diploma and degree programmes for A-Level holders. The closing dates for applications vary. Please refer to their individual websites for accurate information about programmes, entry requirements, fees and application deadlines.

Do bear in mind courses related to art and design are more suitable for those who have an aptitude in these areas. As part of their admission process, these Arts Institutions usually require applicants to submit a portfolio of their works.

### 4: Consider taking up a diploma at local polytechnics

Since Academic Year (AY) 2019, eligible A-Level graduates can be admitted to polytechnics at the start of Year 1 Semester 2 in October. The reduction of one semester allows A Level graduates to complete their polytechnic studies to **2.5 years**, from the usual 3 years.

Starting Academic Year 2020, eligible A-Level graduates can be admitted and be exempted from up to two semesters of polytechnic studies. A-Level graduates will be able to enter polytechnic in the same year of A-Level results released and obtain a polytechnic diploma in **2 years**, rather than 3 years. In all, the polytechnics will offer a wide range of courses with some form of exemptions (one semester or two semesters of module exemptions).

Do check the websites of each polytechnic to find out which courses allow for a shortened duration for A-level graduates to obtain their diploma.

### Section B – General Paper Requirement for Admission to Local AUs

Students can apply to local AUs even if he/she failed General Paper. For example, from SMU's website:

### Section C – Factors to Consider Before Applying to Retake A-Levels

If you are thinking of retaking your A-Levels, consider the following questions:

- Have I considered getting a part-time degree at SUSS or a CSM stacked degree at SIT?
- Have I considered a polytechnic diploma with a possible shorter duration (and subsequent entry into the local AUs)?
- Have I considered the Arts Institutions?
- Have I sought insights from parents, ECG counsellors, teachers, and/or school counsellors?
- Have I checked with the school on my eligibility to redo PU3 @MI? What are my alternatives if I am not eligible to repeat at MI?
- Have I considered Private Education?
- What must I do differently to improve my performance?
- Concurrently, are you doing the following:
  - o Have I applied to all 6 local AUs, making full use of the options available?
  - o Have I appealed to all the AUs, all the way till the start of the academic year?


Do note that for admissions to local AUs, **3 H2 subjects and GP must be taken in one sitting**. For example, from NTU's website:

## Section D – Factors to Consider When Selecting a University/Course



It will be good to seek additional insights from seniors, teachers, ECG counsellors, school counsellors and family members.

## Section E – Private Education

Before considering private education, do consider the following questions:

- Have I done the necessary things to increase my chances of entering local AUs? (see section A)
- Have I applied to all 6 local AUs, making full use of the options available?
- Have I appealed to all the AUs, all the way till the start of the academic year?
- Have I considered getting a part-time degree at SUSS or a CSM stacked degree at SIT?
- Have I considered a polytechnic diploma with a possible shorter duration (and subsequent entry into the local AUs)?
- Have I considered the Arts Institutions?
- Have I checked the cost of Private Education as well as the Financial Aid available? You may want to know some programmes cost less than the AUs, and the same study loans offered at the AUs are available with Private Education. In addition, some degree programmes can be completed in a slightly shorter duration compared to the 6 AUs.
- Have I sought insights from parents, ECG counsellors, teachers, and/or school counsellors?

For private education:

- Students should liaise directly with the respective institutions to find out more about the courses and assess the merits of pursuing a private education programme before deciding.

### Section H – University Admissions Exercise

#### Application Platform

With the implementation of a flexible and differentiated university admissions system, applicants seeking admission to any one of the universities are required to complete **separate** online application forms which have been customized to each university’s requirements. Applicants can access each university’s application forms through their respective websites. See the following page for the relevant web addresses. Separate processing of applications by each university will allow students to receive competitive offers for admission from these universities. An application fee may be payable depending on the university. Please refer to the respective university websites for the application period.

#### Minimum Requirements and New Courses

Please refer to the respective university website pages for information on minimum requirements and any new courses.

#### Indicative Grade Profiles and Programme Places for A-Level Applicants

Eligibility for admission is an important factor when students decide on which programme to study. Applicants need to be aware that the admission criteria may vary from programme to programme. For the popular programmes with small intake, competition is expected to be keener with more stringent grade requirements. Visit the respective local autonomous universities’ websites for the most updated information.

#### Tuition fees

All universities charge a cohort-based fee system. Students will pay the same amount for their entire candidature. For annual tuition fees, please refer to the respective local autonomous universities’ websites for the most updated information.

#### Scholarships and Financial Aid

All the local autonomous universities offer a wide range of scholarships and financial aids for students to apply. Please refer to the respective local autonomous universities’ websites for more information.

### **Section I – What else can I do while serving NS and/or waiting for the universities to reply?**

- Working (temporary, part-time, internships, attachments, serving NS etc.). It does not have to be directly related to the university course of interest. More importantly, it is about gaining knowledge, developing skills and explaining how the experience(s) has helped you grow as a person, which in turn may improve your chances of securing a place in the university.

- Volunteering:

- Attending courses, workshops, talks etc., (Google “free courses Singapore” or similar). Like working, it is about learning from the experience(s).
- Picking up new skills (e.g., a sport, a hobby, coding/programming, transferable skills useful for work).
- If you intend to re-sit for the A-level exams, SAT, ACT or any other tests, this is a good time to do it.
- Consider applying for a course in polytechnics, SUSS part-time degree programmes or private education. If not, at least consider doing some research.
- Those serving NS, you have 2 additional opportunities to apply to the AUs. Make use of the time to improve your situation (refer to points mentioned above)
- Widening network of contacts while doing some of the above suggestions.
- Having a conversation with our ECG counsellor Mr. Tan (telegram handle “chiaboon32”)

### **Section J – Do’s and don’ts**

- Do research on all the universities, courses and options available – best not to limit your options.
- Do reflect on your interests and strengths while shortlisting your choices – have belief, you are the expert of your life, no one else knows better.
- Do seek support with the write-ups (personal statements, quick-takes, resumes etc.,) needed for admissions and other inputs before you finalise your submissions– there are practitioners out there who know a thing or two you don’t. For eg, you could seek the help of the ECG Counsellor, in MI or MOE HQ.
- Do apply to all relevant AUs to give yourself the highest chance to get into a course as universities consider ABA too.
- Don’t rush to submit your applications – it does NOT give you any advantage. You’d be surprised there are such beliefs out there.
- Above said, don’t wait till the last minute – you will be surprised how much work needs to be done for each AU application.
- Don’t rely on hearsays on decision making – always verify info with reliable sources such as the universities or ECG counsellors.
- Don’t limit your AU or course options – if you applied, you still get a chance to appeal. If you didn’t apply, you stand ZERO chance.
- Don’t wait till the dust has settled before seeking help – some options may not be available by then.
